Site Improvement Plan - Reading

As you are aware Reading is an important part of our Site Improvement Plan. We have been working with an Educational Consultant Deb Draper in the area of comprehension. We have also been working alongside our Speech Pathologist to look at Phonemic Awareness. If you would like to know more about what this looks like in your students classroom please feel free to speak to your classroom teacher or leadership. Following are some tips to help support your student at home.

Tips for reading to children

Research continues to show the importance of reading to your and with your child daily. Their minds are constantly at work soaking in new words and ideas. Studies have shown that reading to your child from as early as 6 months old will see an increase in language development and problem solving skills as they grow into their teenage years. A 2019 study estimated that children who are regularly read to in the 5 years leading up to school are exposed to 1.4 million more words than children who aren't read to during those years.

We encourage every family to take 15 minutes or more out of your day to build a new routine of reading together with your child.

Here are some tips to help you make reading part of everyday.

Be consistent. Whether it's one book per day or 15, try to make reading a part of your regular routine. And while you're at it, you don't have to read different books each time you sit down. Kids love hearing the same stories over and over again — and they learn through this type of repetition. Take your time. Be sure to leave enough time to read versus sneaking it in or — worse — making it a chore. Of course, you don't need loads of time each day to read, 15-20 mins is just fine. Importantly, your child should see reading as a dedicated activity and one that you give your full attention to and enjoy. This will give your child a positive view of reading.

Make it fun. Use different voices for characters, pauses, songs, or other dramatics to make the story come to life. Reading with flair will help your child better understand the story. It also provides a good model of expressive and fluent reading for kids who have begun reading by themselves.

Point out connections. Children love applying stories to their own lives. It not only makes the text more meaningful, but it also may help your child cope with different situations they encounter in their everyday experience. Point out those connections to your child. Note where the character was brave about that monster beneath their bed. Applaud the character who is kind to others.

Don't stop with books. Any exchange of words is beneficial to kids. So, if you're uninspired by books one night, turn to telling stories. You can also look at pictures and talk about what you see or ask your child to be the storyteller. Anything that gets language flowing between you and your child is golden.

If you don't have a big range of books at home maybe get together with other families to swap and share, creating your own book club.

Parent Update Week 7, Term 2 – 2021

Planning for the move to high school

Planning is well underway to ensure South Australia will be ready for when year 7 moves to high school next year.

Primary and high schools are working together at every level to ensure the move is successful for families.

We are also drawing on insights we have learnt from a pilot program involving three public high schools that started welcoming year 7 students in 2019.

Benefits for your child

Under the Australian Curriculum, year 7 is designed to be taught in high school where students have access to specialist facilities such as fully equipped science laboratories. Year 7 is already taught in high school in every other state of Australia, with Queensland and Western Australia most recently making the move in 2015. We know from our pilot high schools that year 7s are well and truly ready for high school.

New education builds

Many of our schools are receiving building upgrades to support the year 7 move. The builds will deliver modern facilities to enhance your child's learning.

Workforce planning

Our high schools will be staffed and ready to welcome year 7 and 8 students next year.

We are undertaking our biggest ever teacher recruitment drive in preparation for the move.

We are bringing many primary trained teachers into our high schools, ensuring they can continue to share their extensive accumulated knowledge of year 7 curriculum and teaching methods.

They will also be offered professional learning to ensure they have access to evidence-based approaches to teaching adolescent students.

Local plans

Our primary and high schools have detailed individual implementation plans in place as they prepare for the year 7 to high school move. These reflect the individual needs of their local communities.

Factors being considered at the local level include the marking of special occasions, such as graduation ceremonies, for the double group of year 6 and year 7 students leaving primary school together this year.

Drawing on insights from our pilot program, our schools are also developing their own orientation and transition programs to ensure next year's year 7 and 8 students feel welcome at high school. They will have a strong emphasis on wellbeing, navigating the high school site and making new friends.

Children with additional needs

Our primary and high schools will discuss the strengths and needs of all students moving into years 7 and 8, so that teachers can best plan for their learning and wellbeing. Our key focus is to set all children up for success in high school, including those with additional needs.
